It was before the Fisherfolk got their name and before the UK community formed, before most anything. When the time came a couple of years later the family sold their home and moved to Yeldall Manor and the rich cacophony of the fledgling community.

For most of the years since, Granville worked for St. Mary's Church in Wargrave as a lay minister, living in the school house and acting as Parish Secretary and succeeding Gary Miles as church organist.

Until last year when his immobility became too great, Granville and Sylvia spent many summers here with us on Franklin Avenue.

AIM (Aliquippa Impact Ministry)

AIM has grown from small beginnings just a couple of years ago. *(Fall 2006)* It's about young adults helping the children in the poorest parts of our city have a chance in life. The most effective and perhaps the only effective method of developing hope is through education and mentoring. The one-to-one relationship between at-risk children and selected mentors brings engagement and experience that is otherwise impossible; they meet people with jobs, aspirations, motivation, life-balance, and stability and realize that these same qualities are within their reach as they grow.

During the summer, an intensive 8-week program has tackled literacy, world education and arts. Volunteer workers are recruited – this year two programs will be running simultaneously in different areas. Several permanent team members already live in Celebration's row houses and one of the summer teams will be moving into our last vacant row house at the end of May. Life will undoubtedly be busy but refreshingly lively!

Joe Beckey

Joe grew up in Iowa and spent his first 18 years as an active member of the Roman Catholic Church, serving as an altar boy for 12 years and singing in the choir. During the 13 years after high school he bounced from 2 years in junior college to 4 years in the Air Force, back to college, then another 2 years as part of a Vaudeville Tent Theatre Troupe touring the Mid-west, and finally as a lounge singer and bar manager before returning to his hometown of Muscatine to pursue a career as a commercial printer.

and the rector were part of a music group. After years of heavy drinking, Joe sought help from the rector, and in November, 1990, he joined AA and has been sober for the past 18 years. In 1996 Joe was confirmed by Iowa's bishop, Christopher Epting—now the Community's Visitor. During the service, Joe responded to Bishop Epting's invitation to the congregation to come for prayer and laying on of hands. He was filled with the Holy Spirit and knew he wanted to serve God with everything he had.

In the late '80s Joe started attending an Episcopal Church because he

Two visits to Celebration and three years later, Joe joined the Community in 2000 and made his life vows in 2004. He currently serves as office receptionist, Saturday night worship leader, handles CD production and retail mail orders, and is a member of the GOAL Board (Global Outreach for Addiction Leadership).
